

Pancreas

The pancreas is a gland located in the upper abdomen behind the stomach. Its primary functions are to produce pancreatic juices as an aid to digestion and to manufacture insulin needed for the proper utilization of carbohydrates. It may be the site of an acute inflammatory condition (pancreatitis), abscess, hemorrhage, stones, cyst, pseudocyst, tumor, and cancer.

Abscess and Stone(s)

Present or history, asymptomatic, without complications, fully recovered	Postpone one year from diagnosis or from any surgical procedure such as debridement, endoscopic retrocyrate cholangio pancreatography (ERCP), or stent placement; then no rating.

Cyst or pseudocyst, single, asymptomatic, malignancy ruled out

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Pancreatitis

Pancreatitis may be acute or chronic and attacks are usually manifested by severe abdominal pain. While stones in the bile duct may cause acute pancreatitis, the most common cause of chronic pancreatitis is alcoholism.

Not due to alcohol or malignancy; no surgical procedures such as drainage per endoscope (ERCP) or pancreatectomy and no complications such as diabetes, pseudocyst, or malabsorption

Chronic (lasting more than 8 weeks) or recurrent (more than two acute episodes) pancreatitis
